

Dear friends,

All Saints' Day, also known as the Feast of All Saints, the Feast of All Hallows, the Solemnity of All Saints, or, Hallowmas, is held on November 1st in the Catholic and Anglican churches and also by many mainline Protestants, such as the Lutheran and Methodist communities. It used to be part of the Octave of Allhallowtide, first established by Sixtus IV in 1430, but the Octave was discontinued in the 1955 reforms¹. The churches in communion with Rome – the Syro-Malabar and Chaldean Catholics celebrate All Saints' Day on the First Friday after Easter.

In the Catholic Church, All Saints and All Souls Day have a strong connection stemming from the belief that there is a strong spiritual connection between the Church Militant (the faithful in this world) and the Church Triumphant (those who have attained the Beatific vision of heaven). Both are enjoined to pray for the Church Suffering (those souls in purgatory).

The Collect for the Feast of All Saints (in the 'new' missal) speaks about the prayers of the saints sustaining the church on earth – as does the 1962 Collect. One of my interests in the liturgy of the past ten or so years has been comparing linguistic differences and deviations between the different parts of the Mass (the Collects included, as I often pray from the Collects from both the Extraordinary Form of the Roman Rite (the Mass of Pius V) and the Ordinary Form of the Roman Rite (the Mass of Paul VI).

Sadly, the Mass of the Feast of All Saints in the 1962 order of Mass only uses the Common Preface, but the Preface of the Mass of All Saints promulgated by Paul VI takes full advantage of the feast to pray about celebrating the "festival of Your city, the heavenly Jerusalem..." where we "...eagerly hasten as pilgrims advancing by faith...". Both Collects make explicit mention of God who "...hast enabled us in one solemn feast the merits of all Thy saints..." (1962, Missale Romanum) and "...by whose gift we venerate in one celebration the merits of all the Saints..." (2010, New English Translation).

What does this mean for Cursillo? As part of the church in this world and in view of the many Cursillstas who have passed away, we are recipients of the prayers of the Cursillstas in heaven, and we also have a special part to play in liberating souls from purgatory. Each November, Wollongong Cursillo has a list of dearly departed Cursillistas set up during Ultreya to call to mind those in our reunion groups who have passed away so that we can pray for them in a special way.

As far as the notion of 'pilgrimage' goes, this goes to the very heart of the Cursillos in Christianity movement, which is "much more related to practical theology" (Eduardo Bonnin, *Study of the Charism*. 14), the movement itself originated in Spain on the Camino. One of the core sentiments of the Cursillo movement has it that we are constantly on pilgrimage (I think this is in a way, analogous to the Hebrews in the Torah, being prepared by God for their journey to the Promised Land).

In this way, All Saints Day also has a connection with the accompanying All Souls Day (celebrated on the final day of Allhallowtide) and the season of Allhallowtide, established for Rome by Pope Gregory III (731 – 741). Historically, the first recorded use of the word "Allhallowtide" was in 1471, and is derived from three words: the Old English word *hallow* (meaning holy), the word *tide* (meaning time or season), and the word *all* (which is rendered in Old English as *eall*).

The holiday of Halloween occurs on the first day of Allhallowtide, and 'Halloween' is a contraction of 'All Hallows Eve'. According to some scholars, this was the result of the absorption of some Celtic practices to ease their conversion to Christianity². On All Hallow's Eve, some maintained that the veil between the material world and the afterlife thinned, and, in order to prevent recognition by a soul, people would wear masks or costumes to disguise their identity. It was an English tradition for people to dress up as saints and martyrs.
