I had the privilege in April of being part of the recent Cursillo at Galong, and it was a blessed, wonderful weekend and somewhat a milestone in the Canberra movement, as it was the first "mixed" Cursillo for candidates in Canberra. Over many Cursillos, I have never stopped being amazed at the profound impact Cursillo has in helping us all in our faith journey.

Cursillo is not the weekend, as delightful as that is. But rather, it is in the ongoing journey we hopefully have with our like-minded brothers and sisters in our pilgrimage of life. I am a great believer in small group identity. Belonging to a small group, operating within the framework of a larger identity, is critical. Why? Because we operate as part of the Body of Christ ministering to one another, and while God speaks to us in many ways, a powerful way is through each other, our faith filled brothers and sisters, people who are striving to connect with God as we all are. We depend on each other. I feel the key is to share our faith journey with friends; share the ups and the downs, the glorious mountains we ascend, and sometimes the dark moments when we wonder what is going on. Cursillo has provided a framework for this journey.

So, that's what keeps me in Cursillo. I love soaking up the spiritual understanding I receive in the talks and meditations and basking in the faith and love of the people I meet. I love being part of my men's group, where we have met as friends since about 1996 to share our faith. We never take our eyes off Jesus, and we pray, in humility, that we will always "see" Jesus on our pilgrimage to the Father. Hopefully, we can also bring others along with us.

Spirit Filled

A spirit-filled Cursillo was held from 4 to 5 April 2025 at Galong. This was the first time a mixed Cursillo had been attempted within the Canberra-Goulburn Archdiocese, and reports from those involved indicated this mixing of genders, for all aspects other than table groups, was successful and allowed new ways of interacting. One early high point was the Reconciliation, which prepared all participants for Christ-filled encounters. All talks were delivered with great zeal, accompanied by joyous music and singing. Meal times and free-time periods were relaxing and encouraged interactions. Masses were holy and a special musical event occurred at the final Mass, thanks to our African Cursillistas. The Emmaus Walk strengthened the bonds between table-group members. There was a very enthusiastic response to the Cursillo program; at the Clausura, all new Cursillistas gladly shared their positive experience and the impact on their faith. The Clausura was reasonably well-attended including members from the Cursillo Community and family of new Cursillistas.

The Cursillo attracted 17 candidates (now new Cursillistas) including 10 women and 7 men, with more interested people who had to be turned away after the registration closing date. Participants included two seminarians who enlivened the group and shared the benefits of their learning. We welcome Jimmy, Karina, Jeanne, Celine, Anthony, Lukasz, Tanya, Faye, Hannah, Carolyn, Therry, Glen, Bea, Ben, Aden, Shade and Lawrence as new Cursillistas.

After a change of Lay Directors, Team formation was abbreviated, but by drawing on an experienced team, talks and the overall program were brought together successfully. We thank Kavee, Gerry, Ralph, Barry, Joseph, Jane, Rose, Tom, Wilfred, Arely and Joy. Kavee and Wilfred formed a great pair of Chas and led what could have been the most lively and entertaining Fiesta of all time. Jane stepped in to ensure a successful bookstall. Gerry drew together palanca from across the globe. Barry, Joseph, Rose, Tom and Arely lent vast experience to the weekend. Ralph was an excellent photographer. Majorca- the birthplace of Cursillo

I had the wonderful opportunity to visit Majorca in October 2024, making two delightful trips there!

The first was as part of Cursillo's global committee, the OMCC. According to the Vatican's revised Statutes for the OMCC, committee members must meet face-to-face at least once a year. We chose Majorca for our second gathering due to its deep significance to the Cursillo Movement.

The second invitation came from Eduardo Bonnin's friends, who invited me to attend the 'Fifth Conversations at Cala Figuera' held two weeks later. I was fortunate to be invited because a lovely Brisbane Cursillista, Margaret Morris, who couldn't attend herself, recommended me. Margaret, I genuinely thank you from the bottom of my heart! This wonderful event gathered Cursillistas from around the globe and offered a fantastic chance for me to connect with those I had only met on ZOOM. I truly cherish this opportunity, especially since Conversations at Cala Figuera are such rare gems, happening on average only about every six years, with the first one back in 1994.

Apart from a lot of work, I had the opportunity to explore some truly remarkable historical sights!

- The 'villa' in Cala Figuera, where the first Cursillo took place, is a charming little house now privately owned. While we couldn't explore the inside, it's interesting to note that back in 1944, it didn't have running water or cooking facilities. Kind neighbours prepared the meals during that first Cursillo, showcasing the community spirit. [See photo of the 'villa' as it looks now.]
- Sant Honorat holds a truly special place in our hearts, as it was the site of the very first Vatican-approved Cursillo in 1949. This is where the wonderful tradition of numbering Cursillo Weekends began! Although we've decided not to number our Cursillos here in this Archdiocese, I've noticed that some other areas embrace this practice. [See photo of San Horat's Chapel.]
- The resting place of Don Sebastian Gaya Riera, a remarkable co-founder of Cursillo, is found at beautiful Sant Honorat.
- We were excited to share the special Mass and celebration in Majorca's Cathedral marking the 80th anniversary of Cursillo! [See photo of Cursillo's 80th celebration.]
- Eduardo Bonnin founded our Movement. His grave is located at the Capuchin Church, a cherished spot he frequented during his lifetime. Visiting this site deeply moved me, as I thought about Eduardo's significant influence on our lives and his gift for leading people to a relationship with God. - Eduardo's two-room apartment served as a cosy office where he explored his creativity, writing articles, giving talks, and creating books. It was also a welcoming space for visitors who wanted to share a conversation with him. Generously sharing his time, he dedicated himself entirely to his work. Though he never married, his compassion extended to those in need; he regularly visited the nearby prison to support the inmates there.
- Whenever Eduardo enjoyed a coffee with someone, he had a delightful habit of folding
 the empty sugar packet into a fun shape, which soon became his charming signature
 touch. As a sweet gesture, he would lovingly gift this little creation to the person he was
 chatting with. Today, his office proudly displays a jar filled with these treasured
 mementos from coffees shared long ago.
- Eduardo's office is a treasure trove of countless papers and articles he has penned, with books and folders adorning nearly every wall. The rest of the space is lively with photos, posters, cherished memories from Cursillo gatherings worldwide, alongside plaques, flags, and thoughtful gifts he has received. We learned that a wealth of additional materials is lovingly stored off-site in a warehouse, also to be explored.
- To assess Eduardo's suitability for canonisation, scrutineers are carefully reviewing all his writings, the talks he's delivered, and the books he's read and underlined. It is quite a monumental task! [See photo of Eduardo's office.]

It's quite a challenge to capture all the incredible insights I gained from my visits to Majorca and the delightful interactions with everyone I met in just one document! As I wrap up this

article, I want to share a beautiful takeaway from Conversations. Auxiliary Bishop Eusebio Elizondo from Seattle, USA, shared his heartfelt thoughts about God during the opening Mass. His words were so eloquent that I will not perfectly capture them, but I sincerely hope to convey a bit of his touching message to you.

Bishop Eusebio said that our God has three 'character flaws':

- Our God is persistent! He never gives up on us. He pursues us until we finally surrender to Him.
- Our God has no memory! He does not remember our sins. He accepts us here and now, as we are, not as we were.
- Our God has lousy taste! He chose us!
